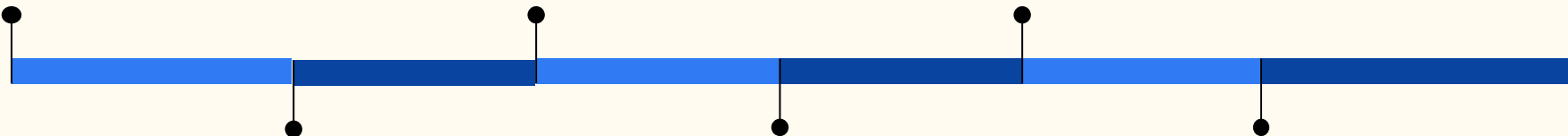

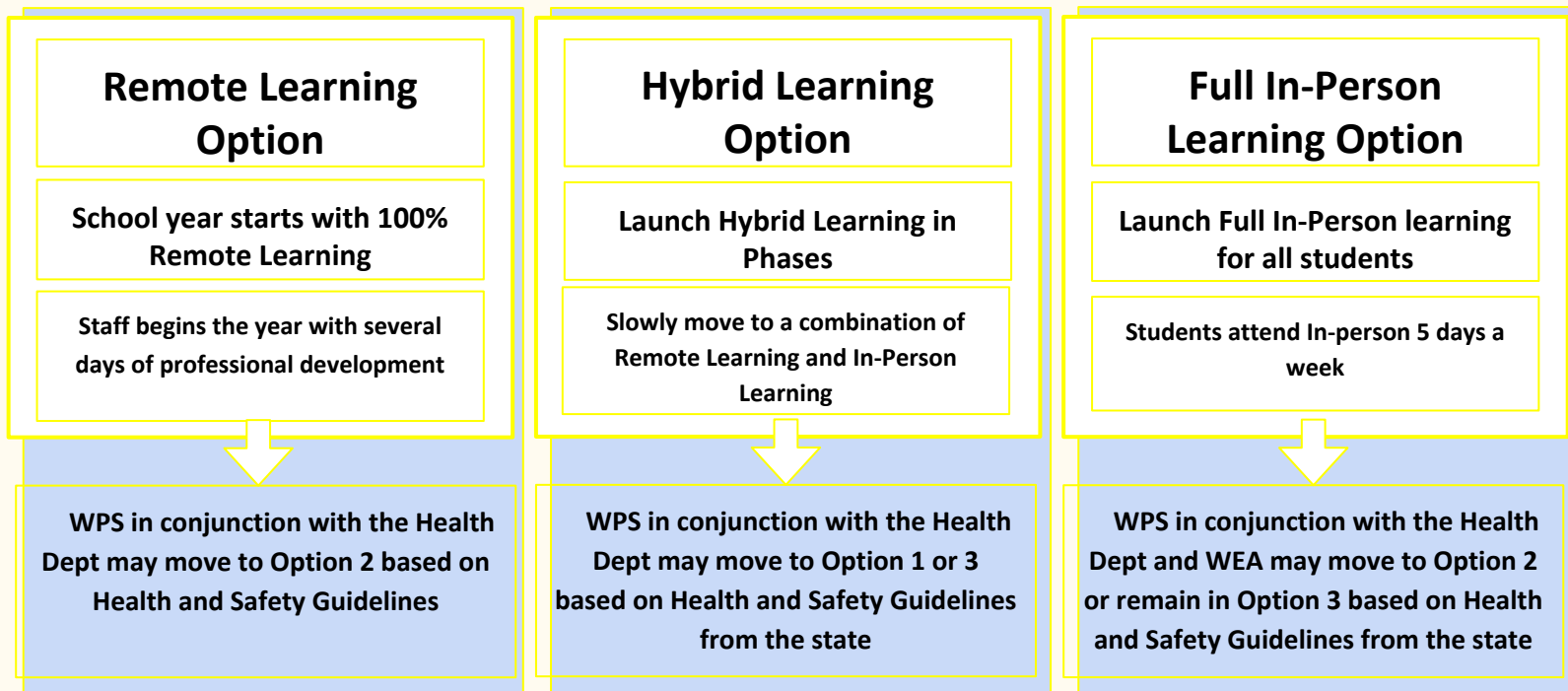

Weymouth Public Schools Phased Approach

In considering DESE and MTA/WEA guidance, we would like to use a phased approach to return to school.

- Students phase in from Remote Learning to Hybrid Learning slowly & safely
- Building Leaders first guide their staff through new safety procedures
- Educators receive professional development to improve the remote experience
- Educators schedule virtual conferences with families
- Families may have the option to choose full Remote Learning for Term 1 to start, but DESE and medical field recommend return to school

Possible Phasing Target Dates

1. Possible School Start Dates For PreK to Post-Grad

- a. Staff return to the buildings for professional development September 1, 2020
- b. Students begin Remote Learning on September 8, 2020 (3 days of fall PD for all Staff 180 for kids)
- c. Students begin Remote Learning on September 14, 2020 (7 days of fall PD for all Staff 175 for kids)

2. Possible Target Dates to Phase into Hybrid Learning

- a. September 14, 2020- aligns with b. start date
- b. October 5, 2020- aligns with b. or c. start date
- c. January 4, 2021- WEA leadership proposed and preferred start date

What Does Hybrid Mean...and what we have to consider based on DESE recommendations

It is different in every district!

It depends on space in each building- Pressure testing completed for each school

DESE has asked us to use all auxiliary space for teaching and learning-Gym, Aud

DESE has asked for our most needy students to return to school in person

DESE has asked for minimum cohort interactions -Impacts Weycare, electives

Remote Learning - Reflecting on Spring 2020

- Family Survey (May 1-14): 840 respondents
- Teacher Survey (June 24 - July 3): 271 respondents

Highlights of Results

Many families, teachers, and students are comfortable with Google tools. Teachers, however, are less comfortable with Clever (single sign-on for our curriculum products such as Big Ideas Math, Lexia, and Actively Learn).

Technology was not an issue for most families: # of devices, availability of internet, and capability of students to use the Google tools (e.g. submitting assignments, participate in Google Meet)

In most cases, communication from the schools and teachers has been clear and in the just the right amount

Families and teachers both report that students struggle, as many students across the U.S. do, with soft skills more so since moving to the remote learning platform.

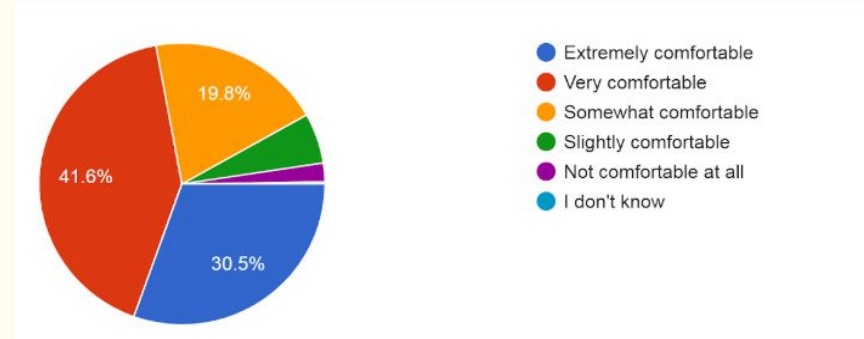
Trends from Remote Learning Surveys

Reflecting on Spring 2020

Families Comfortable with Google Tools

Most families (72%) believe their children are either very or extremely comfortable with Google tools.

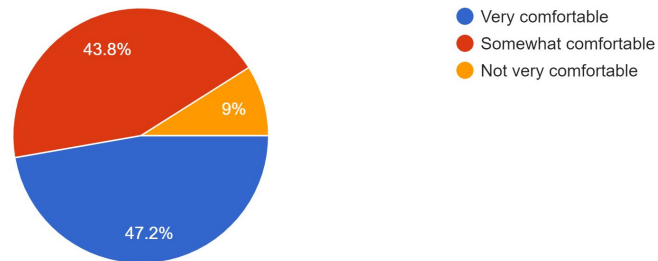
Nearly all parents are at least somewhat comfortable with the Google tools themselves and can provide support to their children (40%) or feel comfortable leaving this to their children and teachers (50%)



Most Students Comfortable with Google Tools

Nearly half of students (47%) are either very comfortable with Google tools, but there is still room for improvement as almost one in ten students are not very comfortable with these tools

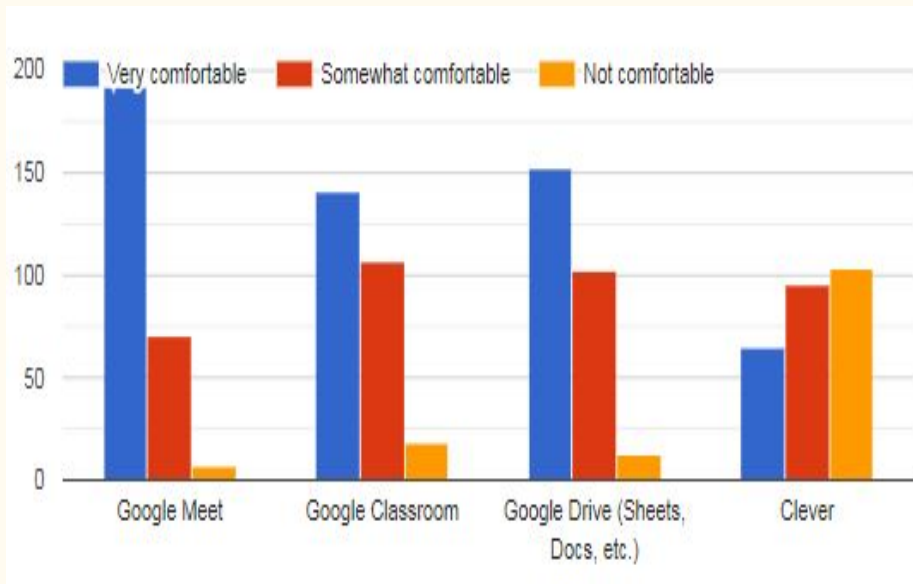

Teachers Comfortable with Google Tools

Many teachers (71%) are very comfortable with Google Meet while slightly more half are very comfortable with Google Classroom (53%) or Google Drive (57%).

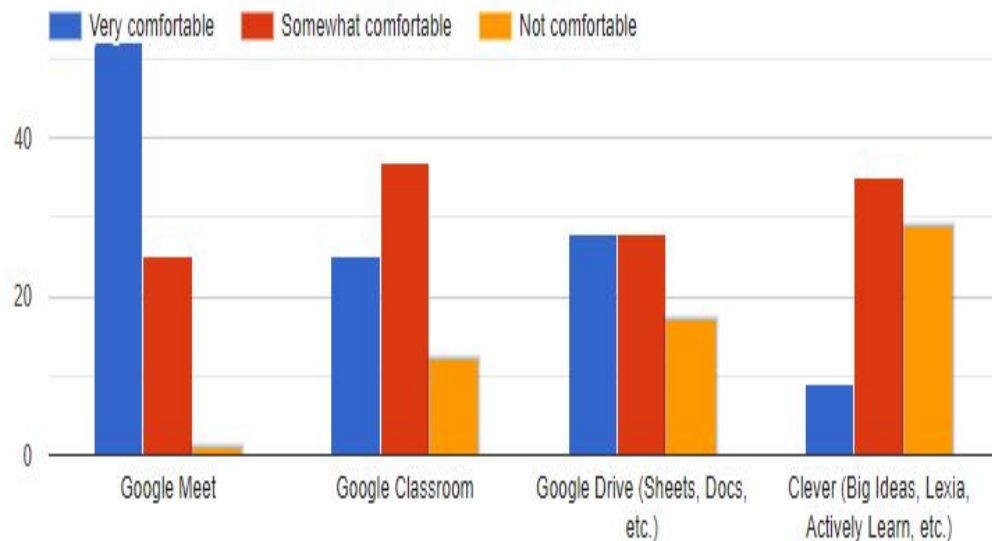
A much smaller proportion (25%) are very comfortable with Clever.



Paraprofessionals Somewhat Comfortable with Google Tools

Many paraprofessionals (67%) are very comfortable with Google tools while fewer are very comfortable with Google Classroom (32%) or Google Drive (36%).

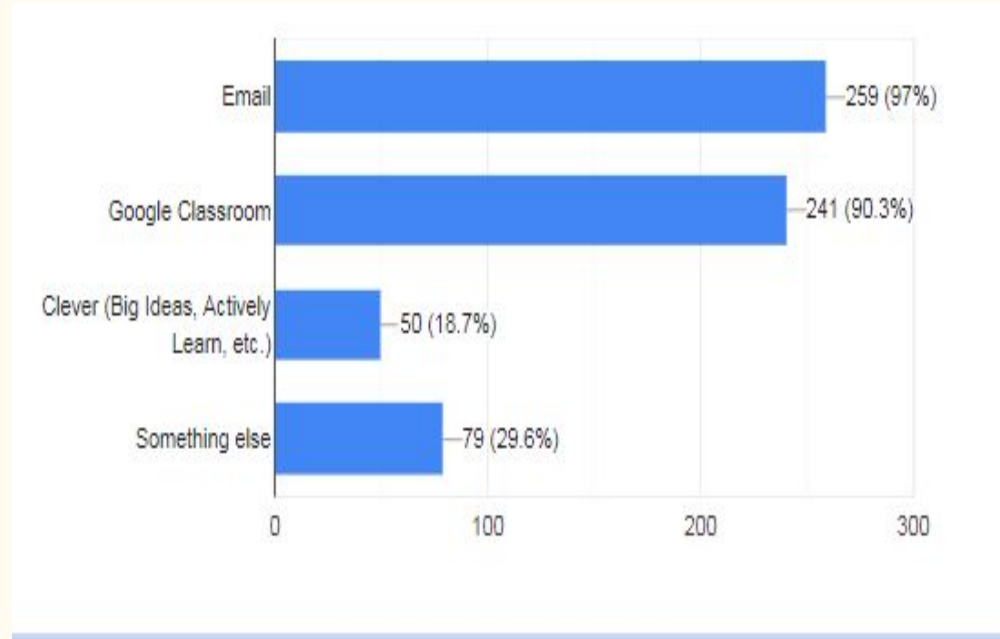
A much smaller proportion (12%) are very comfortable with Clever.



Type of Communication from Teachers

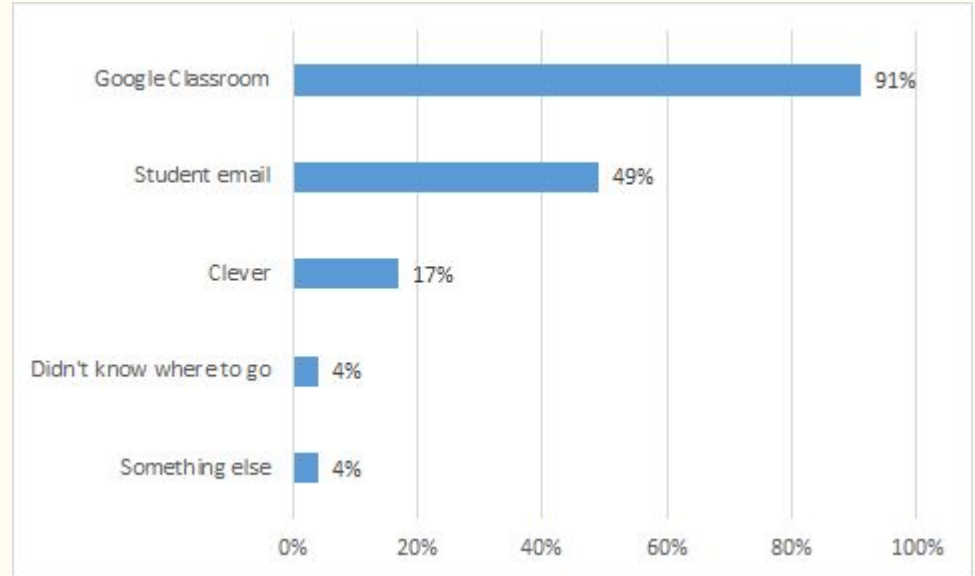
Most teachers use email (97%) and/or Google Classroom (90%) to communicate about learning activities.

Few (19%) use any products in Clever for this purpose.



Types of Communication Students Use

Nearly all students indicated they use Google Classroom to (91%) to find out what learning activities their teachers had assigned.

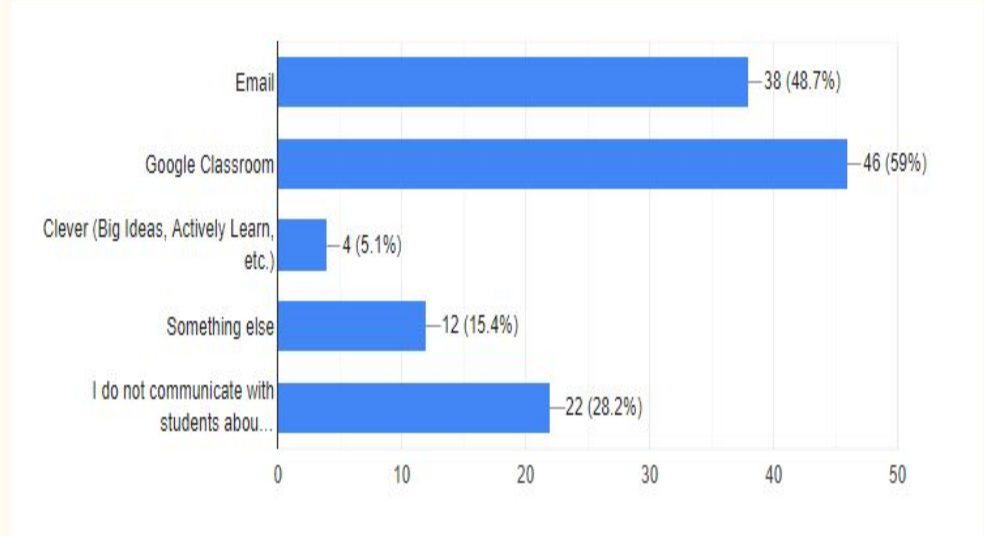


Type of Communication from Paraprofessionals

About paraprofessionals use email (49%) and/or Google Classroom (59%) to communicate about learning activities.

Very few (5%) use any products in Clever for this purpose.

About one-fourth (28%) reported not communicating with students directly - only half of these work in an instructional role as a paraprofessional.

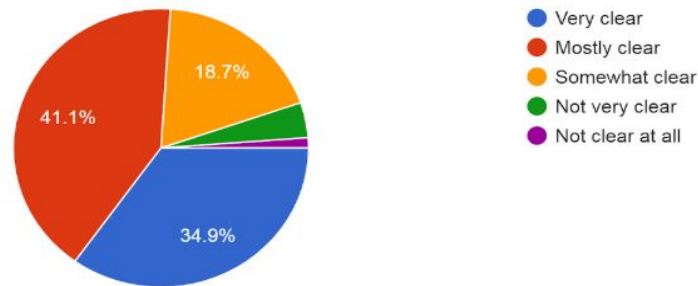
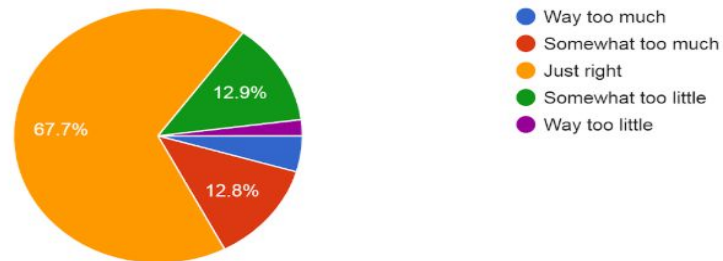


Families Report Communication is Clear and in the Right Amount

Two-thirds of families (68%) indicate that the amount of communication is just right.

The remaining third are equally split between too much (17%) and too little communication (18%).

Most families (76%) indicate the communication has been very or mostly clear. Another slice (19%) report that the communication has been somewhat clear. These two groups represent 95% of families responding to the survey.

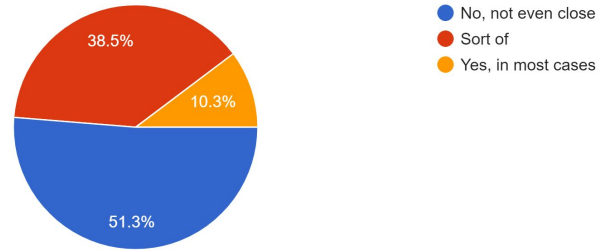


Most CTE Students Report Needing More Training

Over half of CTE students (51%) indicated that during remote learning they were not able to get the training they needed.

Student Struggles - But Not Unique to Weymouth

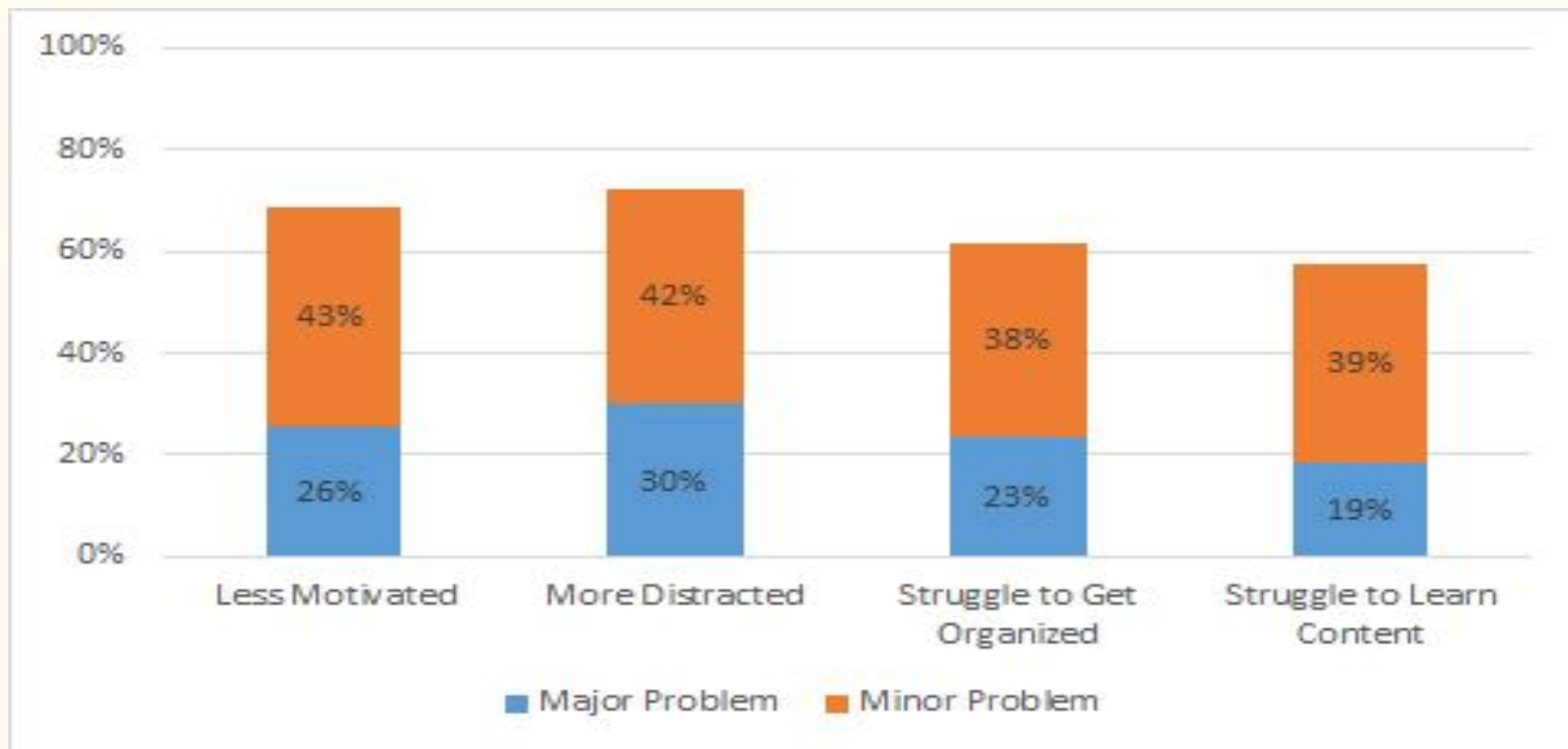
Many parents, teachers, and paraprofessionals report their students struggling at least somewhat with “soft skills” since moving to a remote learning platform and has resulted in their children being:

- Less motivated
- More distracted
- Struggle to get organized

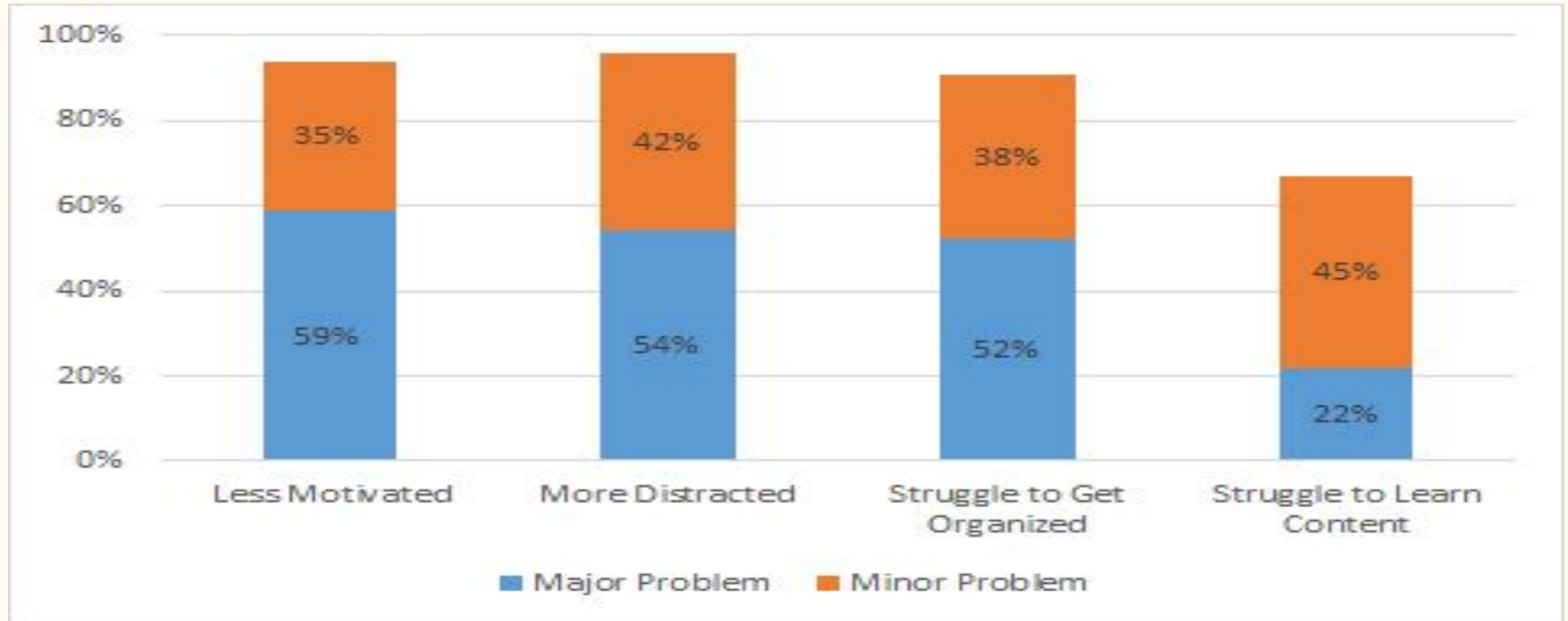
Some families and teachers also report their students are struggling more academically now.

A few families indicate that there have been communication issues or technology problems that has resulted in missing assignments.

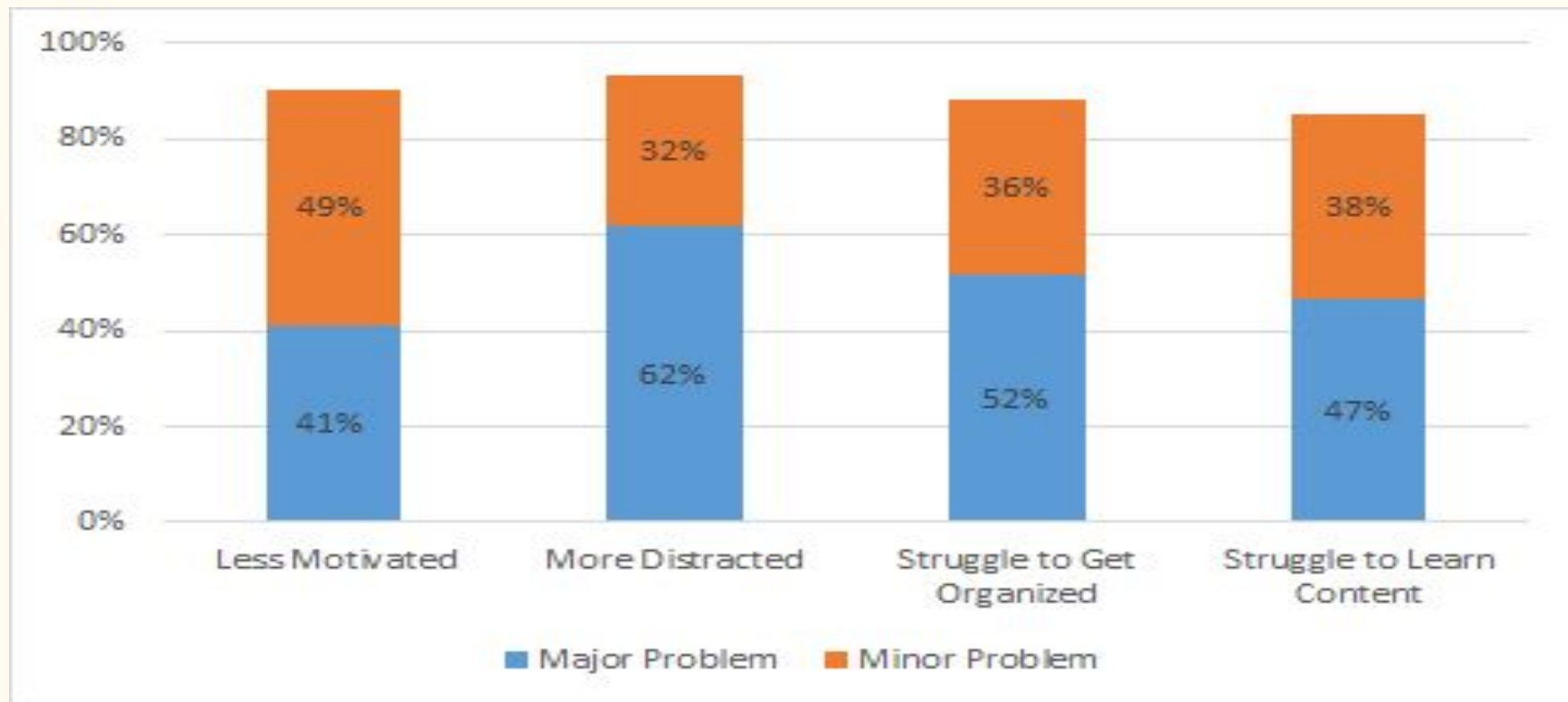
Families Report Students are More Distracted and Less Motivated



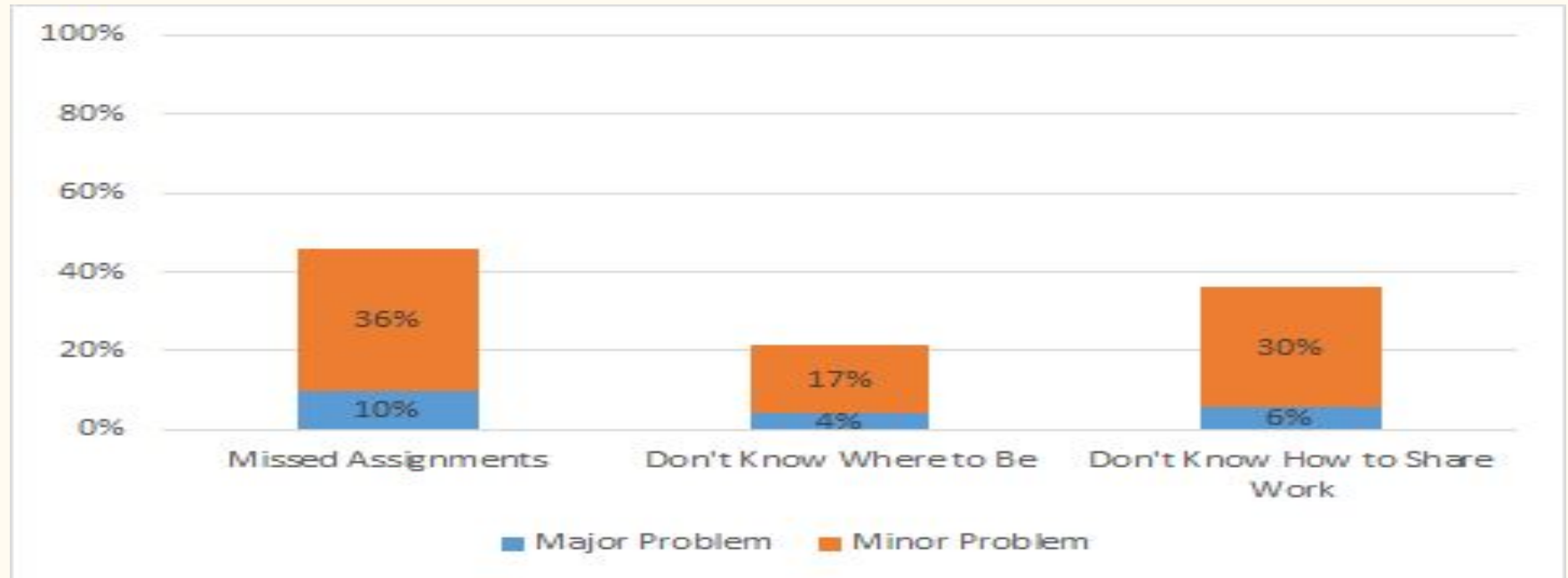
Teachers Report Similar Patterns, but as a Major Rather than a Minor Problem



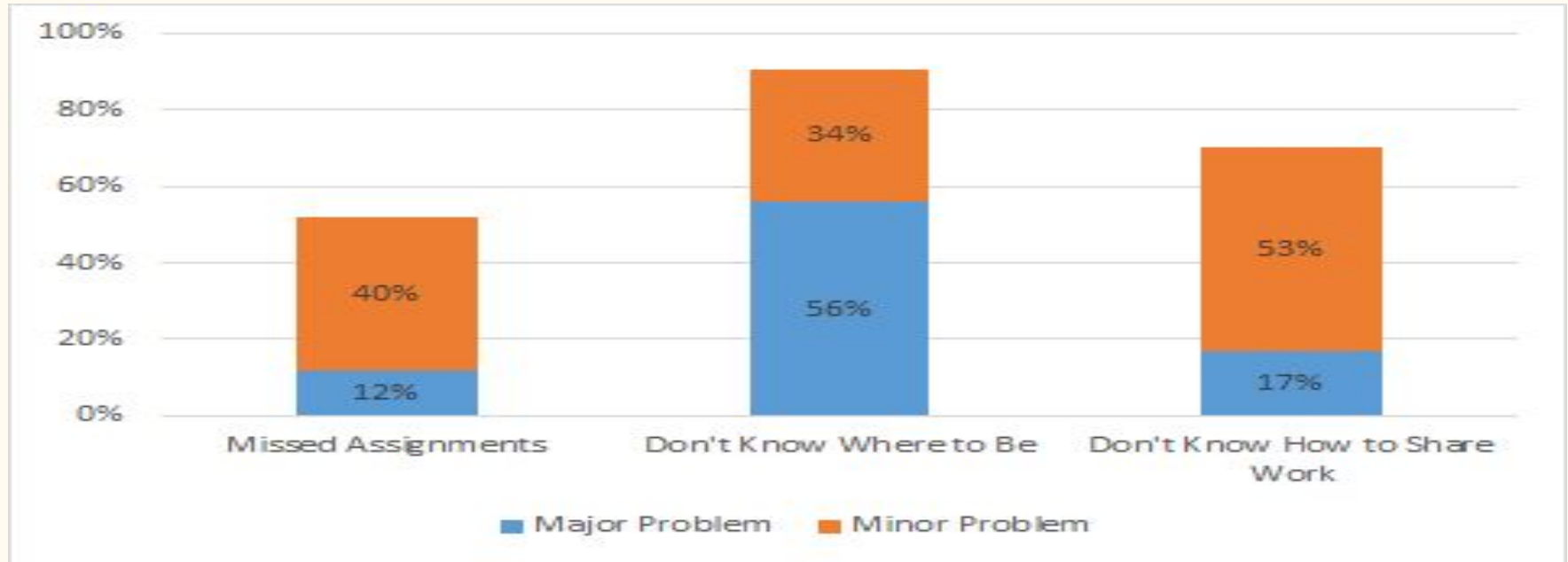
Many ESPs(Educational Support Professionals) Concur with Teachers



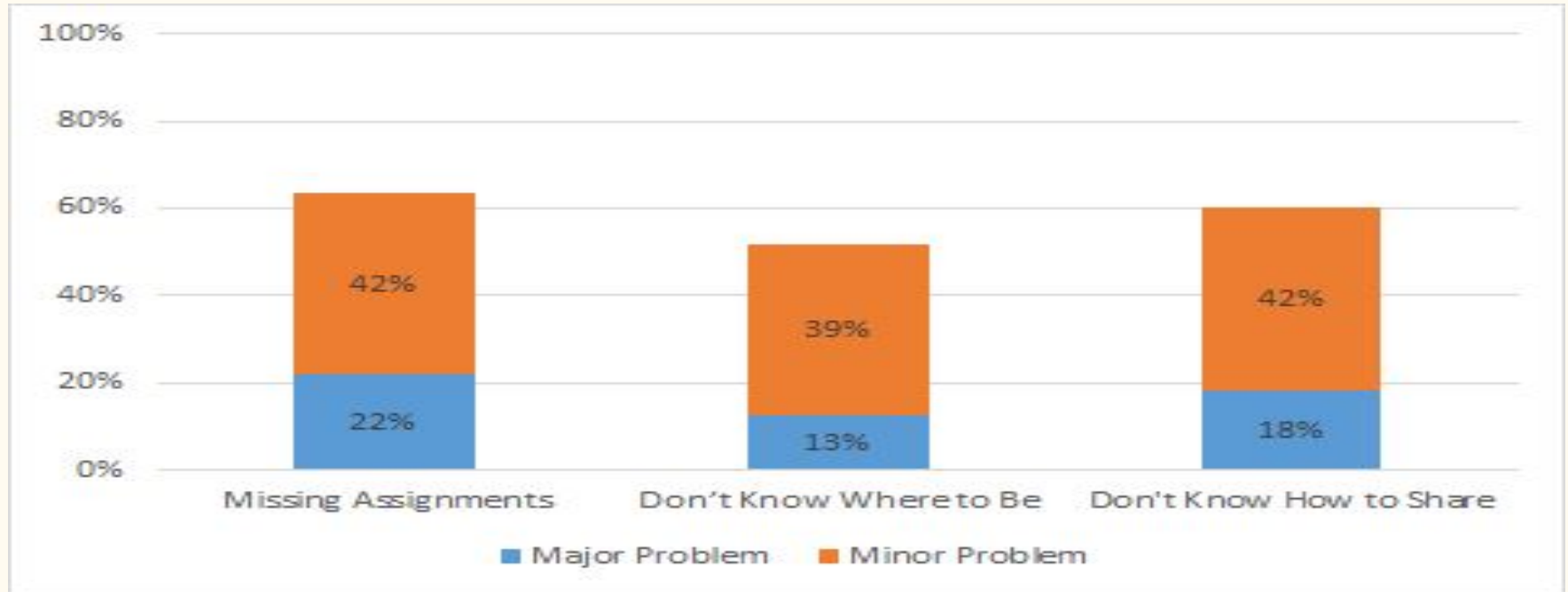
Families Report Logistical Issues as Minor Problems



Teachers Report Some Logistical Issues as Major Challenges

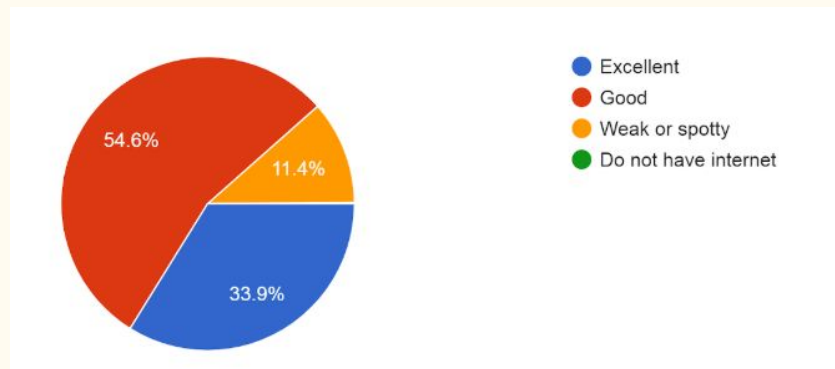


ESPs Also Report Some Logistical Issues But Usually as Minor Issues

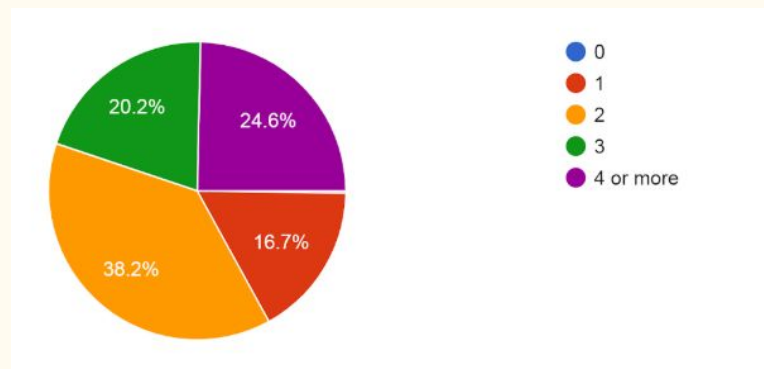


Most Families Report Technology Not an Issue

Most families (89%) report good or excellent internet in their home.



Many families (83%) have two or more devices (e.g., computer, laptop, Chromebook) in their home available for their children.

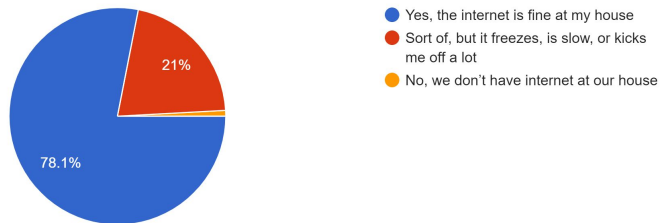


Most Students Report Technology Not an Issue

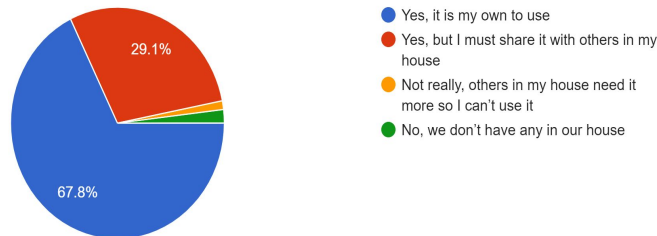
Most students (78%) report sufficient internet service in their home.

Nearly all students (97%) report having access to a devices (e.g., computer, laptop, Chromebook)at home for remote learning. In some cases, it is shared with other family members.

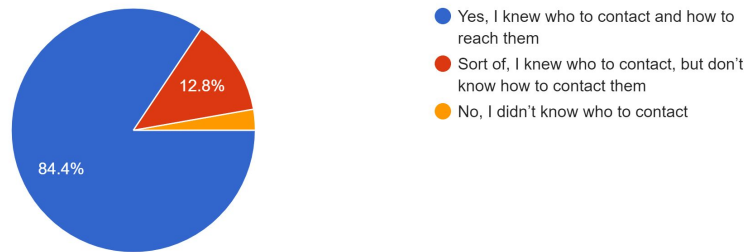


Most Students Know How to Reach Out for Support during Remote Learning

Most students (84%) report knowing not only who to contact but how to reach them if they needed help during remote learning.

Students a Bit More Nervous

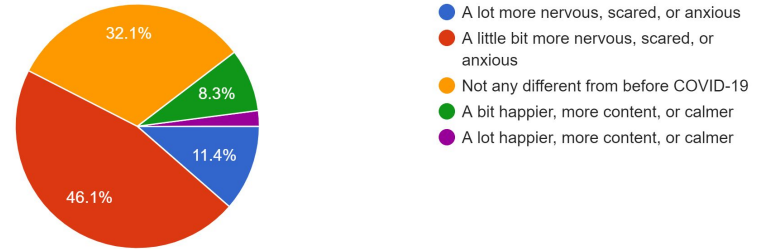
About half of the students (46%) feel a bit more nervous than before COVID-19.

Another third (32%) feel no different.

The remaining students are equally split:

- A lot more nervous (11%)
- Happier (10%)

Most Students Report Low Level of Concern about Personal Wellness and Safety

Most students have no concerns (35%) while a small proportion have a great deal of concerns (8%).



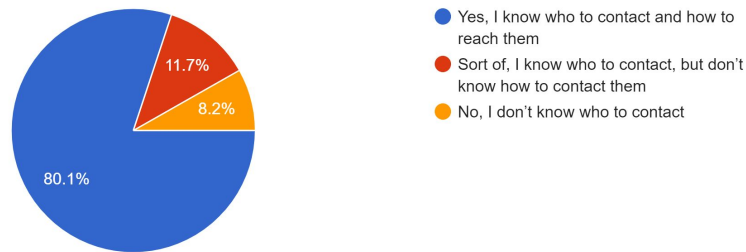
Students Know Where to Turn for Help

Most students (80%) know how to reach out for help regarding their own mental health, safety, and wellness.

However, one in 12 students do not know who to contact.

14. If you need help for your own mental health, safety, or wellness do you know how to reach out for support?

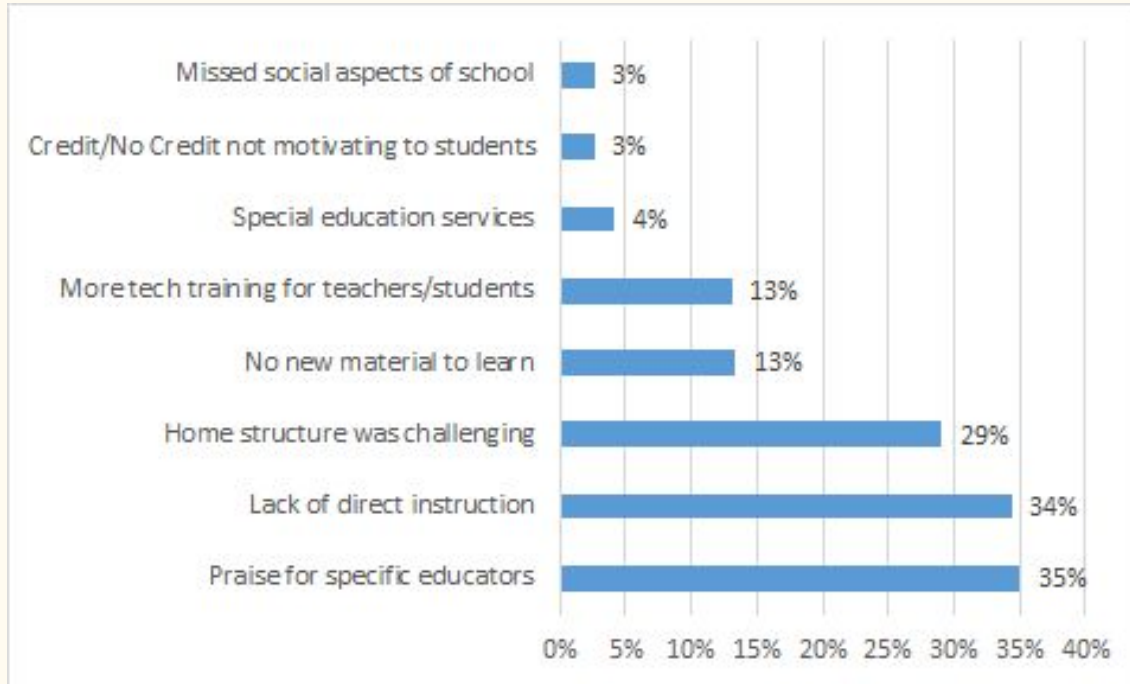

Trends from Planning for Re-Opening Surveys

Looking forward to 2020-21

Highlights of Results

Concerns: Run the entire gamut on no concerns to very concerned

Transportation: Most families are choosing the same method for 2020-21 as they did for 2019-20.

Weycare: Families want before- and after-school care.

Face Masks: Nearly all families support their children wearing masks in the the school building and on the bus. However, a few plan to leave that decision up to their child (or child cannot/will not wear a mask).

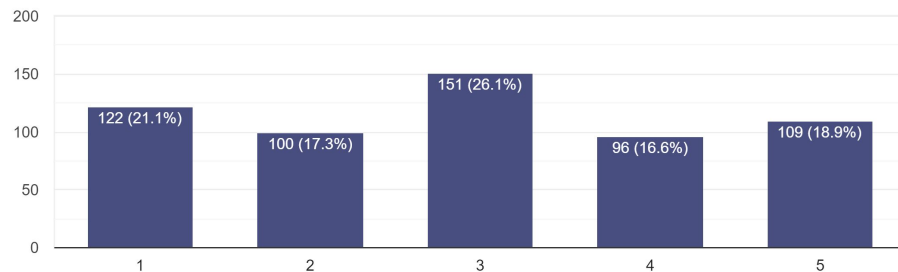
Mode of Learning: Most families want their children to return to the school building full-time. Few want remote learning as a full-time learning method. Students want more direct instruction from their teachers.

Students' Level of Concern

The level of concern among students run the gamut from no concerns at all (21%) to extremely concerned (19%).

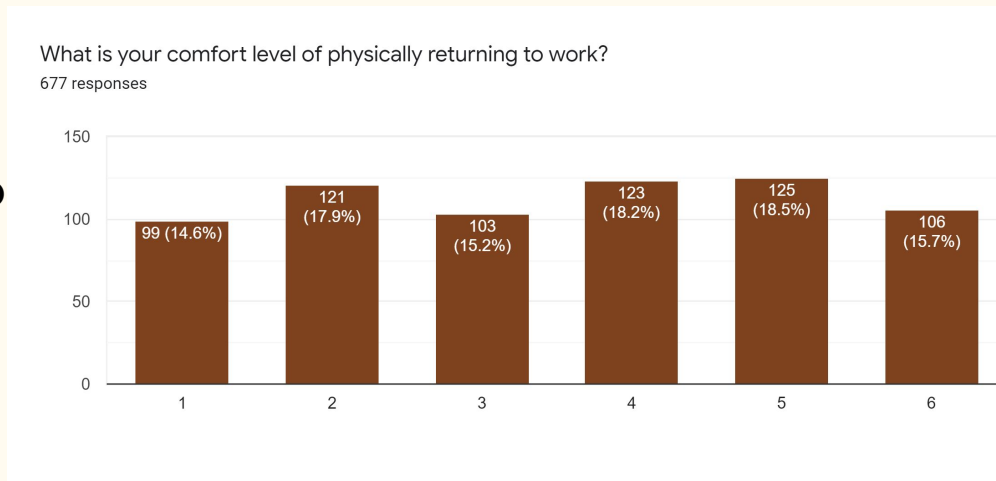
18. On a scale of 1 to 5, please rate how comfortable you feel returning to the school buildings in the fall.

The level of concern among staff members also run the gamut from no concerns at all (15%) to extremely concerned (16%).

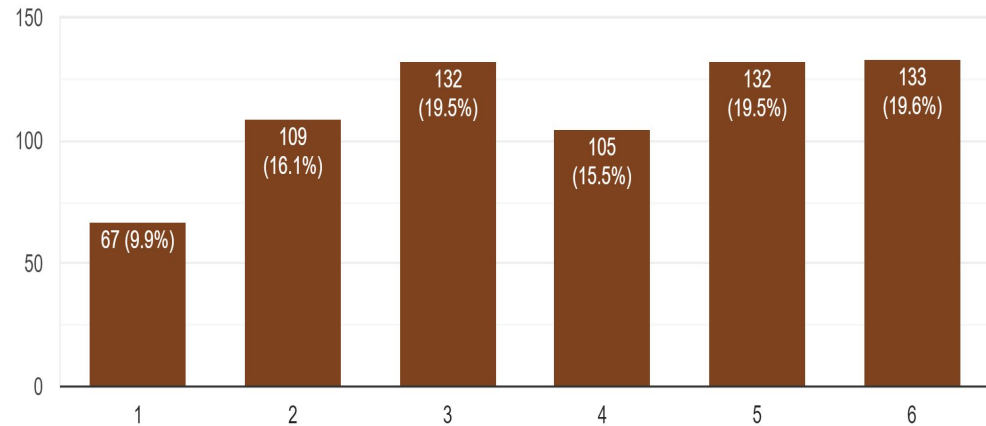


Staff Concerned about Buildings Full of Staff & Students

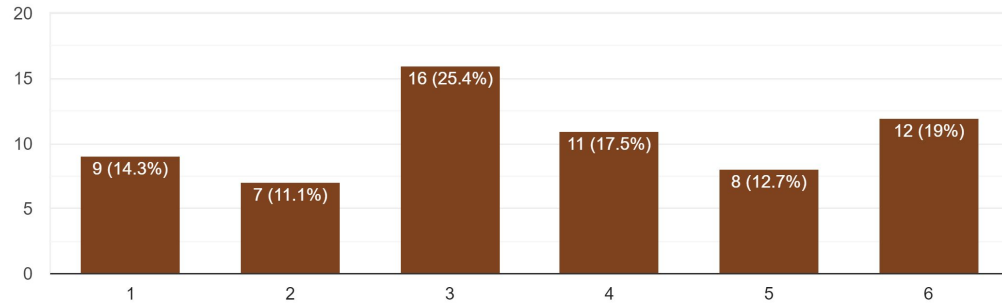


Staff Concerned about Opening Weycare and the WHS Childcare Program

The level of concern among Weycare and WHS Childcare Program staff members also run the gamut from no concerns at all (14%) to extremely concerned (19%).

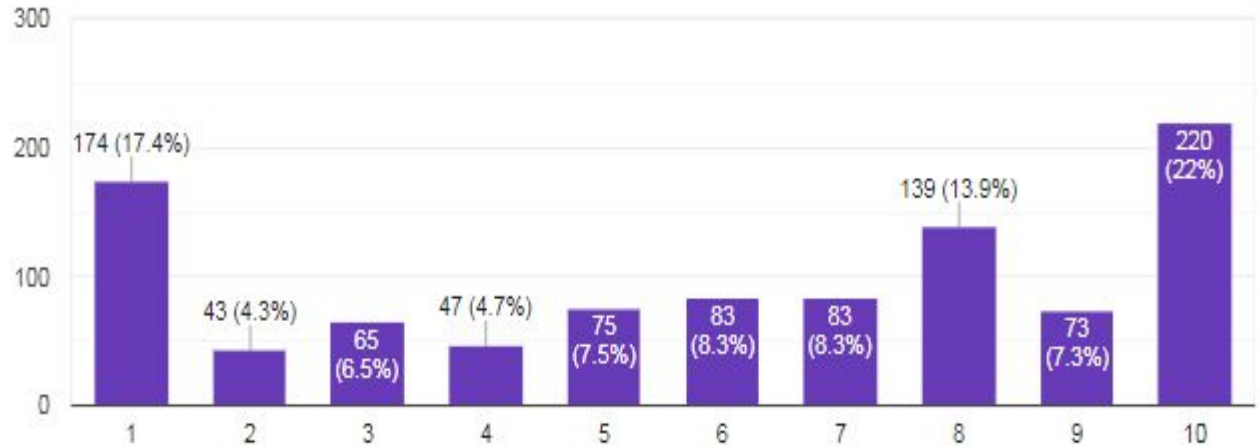
What is your comfort level with re-opening these programs?

COVID Concerns Regarding Bus Ridership

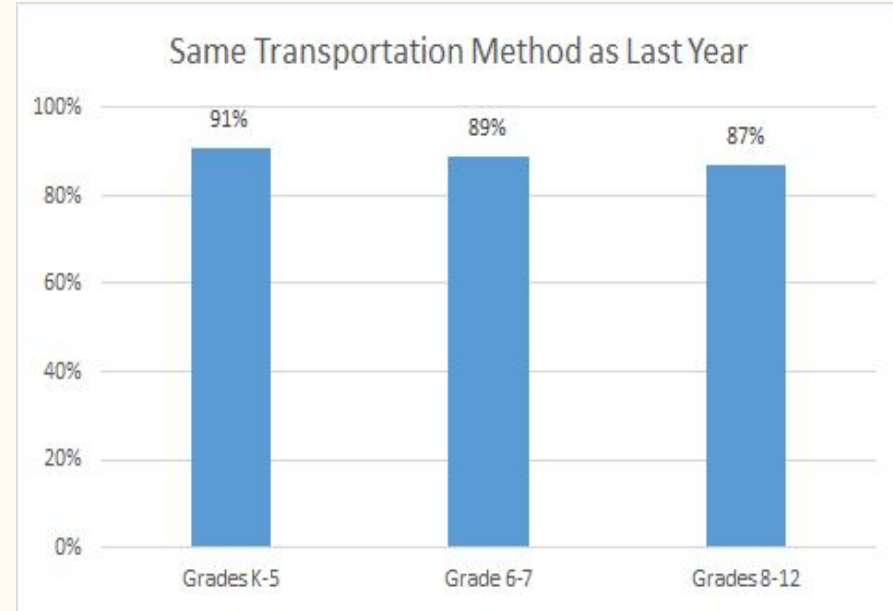
COVID: Just about as many families have no concerns at all (17%) as compared to those who are extremely concerned (22%) with their children traveling on a school bus or van.



Transportation: Families Report Few Changes

Most families report they will be utilizing the same method for transportation they used this past school year (walk, school bus, car, etc.).

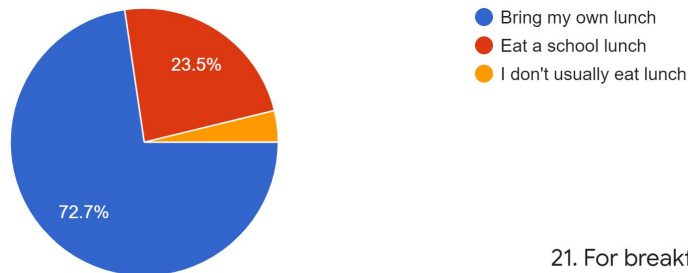
However, a small single-digit percentage will opt out of riding the school bus which will be offset somewhat by the families that will be opting into riding the school bus.



Fall 2020: Breakfast and Lunch Participation

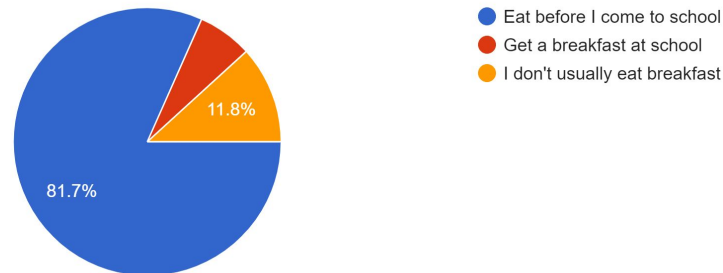
20. For lunch, starting in September, what do you plan to do on MOST days?

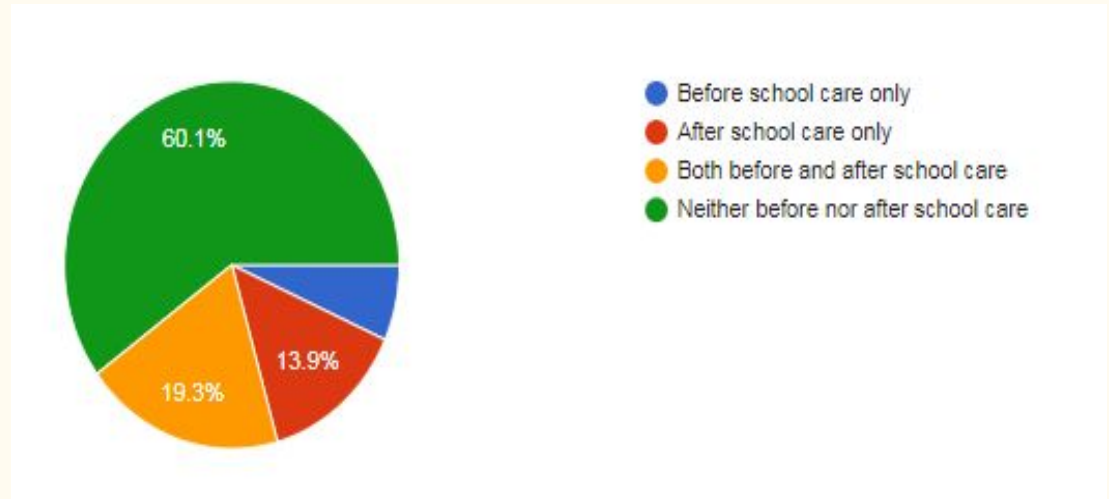
21. For breakfast, starting in September, what do you plan to do on MOST days?

Weycare: Families Want Before and After School Care

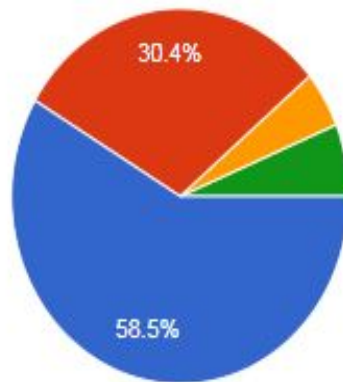
Typically, about 15% (~700 to 800 students) of the student population utilize Weycare for either before school and/or after school care. According to the family survey, we can likely expect similar numbers seeking Weycare for 2020-21.



Most Families will Support Mask Wearing

The vast majority of families (89%) will support their children wearing masks at school and on the bus or van.

A small proportion (5%) plan to leave it up to their child. An additional 6% indicate their children cannot or will not wear a mask.



- Absolutely!
- Yes, I will make it clear to my child.
- Not really, I will allow my child to do as he/she wishes regarding a face mask.
- No, I will not support this (my child cannot/will not wear a face mask).

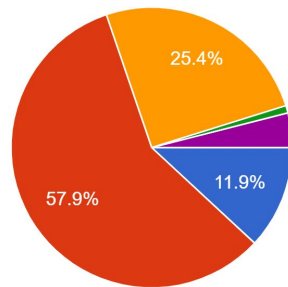
Most Students will Support Mask Wearing

The vast majority of students (83%) will comply with wearing masks at school and on the bus or van.

A small proportion (5%) reported that they can't or won't wear a mask.

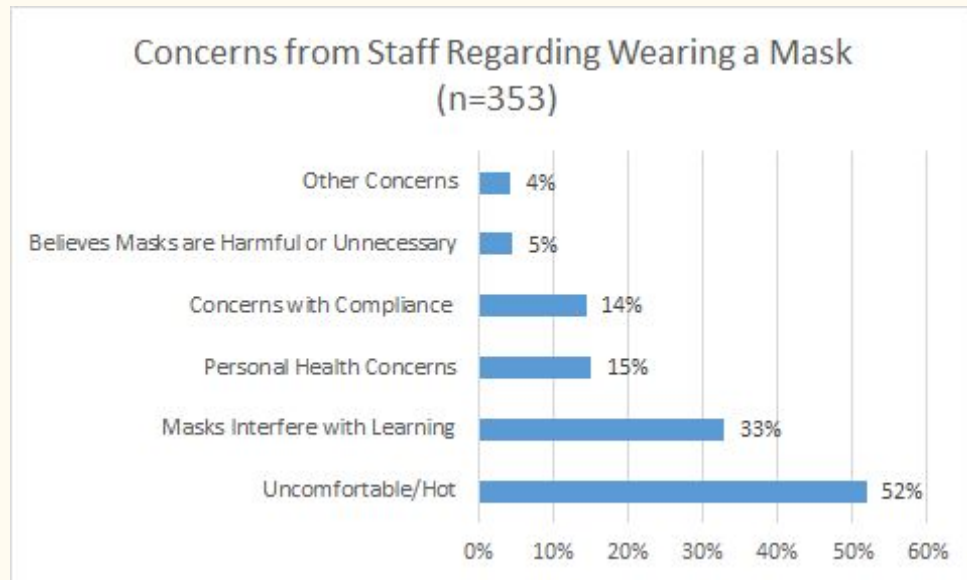


- Very comfortable...I like my mask and wear it often

Staff Have Concerns Regarding Masks

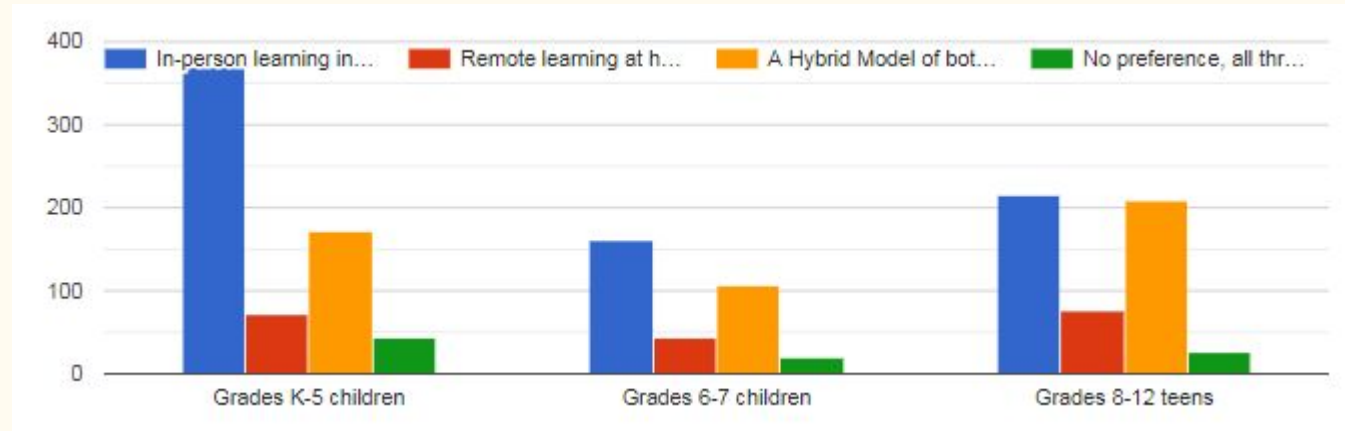
About half of staff (54%) have concerns about wearing a mask all day while the other half do not (46%).

Of those who expressed concerns, over half stated that they are hot and uncomfortable (52%) and one-third (33%) indicate they interfere with learning (e.g., muffled sound, can't see face expressions, can't show how to form letter sounds with mouth).



Most Parents Want Students to Return to the Buildings, or at least a Hybrid Model, for 2020-21

At the primary level, most families are looking for their children to return to in-person learning full time. Few families prefer remote learning at the sole learning format.



Most Students Want Direct Instruction and Feedback During Remote Learning

Top five (out of nine options) that would make remote learning a better learning experience according to students:

- More direct, real time instruction from MY teachers (71%)
- More direct, video-based instruction with MY teachers with chat feature for questions (59%)
- More feedback on what I have learned, not just a score or grade (51%)
- Grades posted regularly by my teachers, not just credit/no credit (48%)
- Being able to work collaboratively with a partner or small group in Google Meet (48%)

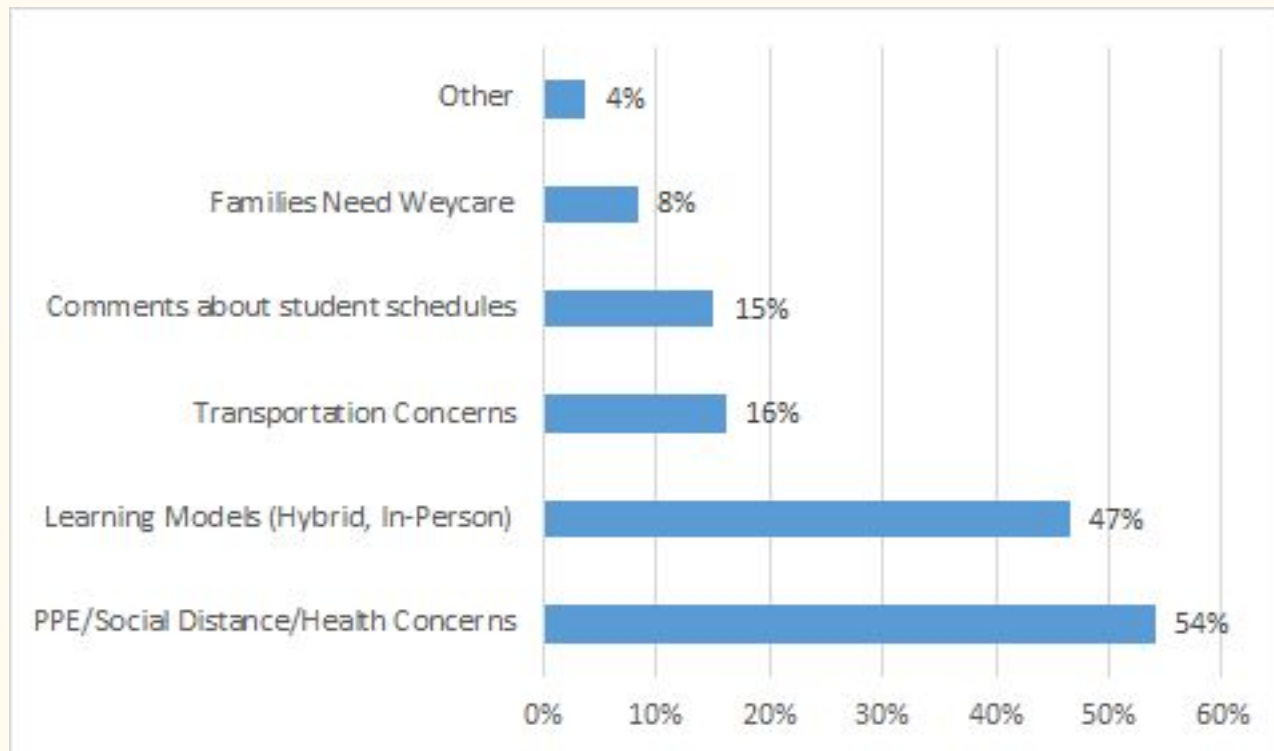
Supports Staff Need for the Fall

In planning for the fall, what kinds of supports do you anticipate needing? (558 staff responded across all bargaining units)

- **Training**/PD related to technology, new curriculum, mindfulness, and safety during COVID (52%)
- Access to **curriculum materials** (51%)
- **Collaborating** with an instructional coach, colleague, or my principal on my instruction (49%)
- Opportunities for **social-emotional well-being** (486)%
- Other, such as **PPE, sick time, daycare** (10%)

- August 10th Return to School Plan sent to DESE and posted on WPS website
